REPORT RECOMMENDATION

- 1. That Council Report No. AR20/26971 titled 'COVID-19 Community Development Fund' as presented on 05 May 2020 be noted.
- 2. That Council endorses the establishment of a COVID-19 Community Development Fund and allocates \$200,000 to this fund.
- 3. That Council endorses Attachment 1, which provides the information, criteria and application form relevant to the COVID-19 Community Development Fund
- 4. That Council endorses the Chief Executive Officer to make decisions relating to the minor works (with a ceiling of \$5,000) to expedite this part of the process.

BACKGROUND

Council considered a range of responses at its meeting on 31st March 2020, which were then discussed further at the designated informal gathering on 23rd April 2020. One of the elements discussed was the opportunity to provide community and sporting groups with quick access to funding, whilst they are closed because of COVID-19 so that they may carry out repairs, renovations or improvements.

As a result of these discussions the application form and information (please see **Attachment 1**) has been drafted for Council endorsement. This allocation and funding remains separate to the capital grants for \$100k proposed in the draft Annual Business Plan and Budget for 2020/21, which is subject to its own criteria, match funding requirements and limited to sporting clubs.

DISCUSSION

The intent of the Community Development Fund is to enable an injection of funds to undertake works whilst community and sporting groups cannot use their facilities as a result of restrictions in place because of COVID-19. The works proposed to be enabled are for works to be completed quickly (so that they have no adverse impact should restrictions be quickly eased) and that such works be undertaken by volunteers or local contractors using local suppliers.

The application process is intended to not be a barrier and, if additional consents are required, these will be prioritised by Council Officers and the fees associated with them waived. The application process is intended to gain enough information to ensure the Council has done its due diligence, but without being a burden or requiring information that may not readily exist.

One of the key areas is for Council to understand the works proposed and the benefits they will bring for major applications. There is also a need to see whether volunteers (using appropriate social distancing) can undertake works and source their materials from local suppliers or whether a local contractor will be engaged, who again will use local suppliers.

The application process will be handled through the COVID-19 hub on the Council's website. Officers will support community and sporting groups and will advise such groups as to the best route for achieving their goals and objectives.

The Community Development Fund is intended to be a standalone grant funding stream, As such it does not require match funding from the applicant and it cannot be used as match funding towards other Council grant funds. However, if community or sporting groups can sustainably commit funds towards the major projects then this will enable the allocated funds to be spread further.

It is proposed that \$200,000 be allocated on commencement. Should Council find that either take up is low or high, or the intent of the fund is overtaken by events, then it may choose to vary the amount of funding or the limits at any time.

It is suggested that the Council Administration (through a delegation to the Chief Executive Officer) handle the minor applications and that major applications be brought before Council. A report on the uptake and use of the funds will be brought back before Council on the conclusion of the scheme or if additional funds are required.

CONCLUSION

This funding stream provides a quick response to our community to carry out repair, renovation or improvement works to community and sporting facilities. It is an investment in our people, our economy and our recovery and enables us to use this hiatus in community and sporting events to our advantage.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT FUND

What is the rationale of the fund?

Quick injection of finance into repairs / maintenance of community and sporting facilities, which can be undertaken whilst the facilities are not in use because of the COVID-19 pandemic. This fund is about getting work done <u>NOW</u> in preparation for a return to community gatherings and sport. The stimulus is expected to flow back in to the community because of the need to source labour (including volunteers) and materials locally. The Council intends to make decisions quickly on applications and will consider increasing the funding available should demand outstrip supply. Preference will be given to projects which work to address compliance issues including disability access to facilities.

How much is available?

Up to \$200,000 is available as part of the fund.

Is match funding required?

No, but it may help your application (particularly on larger projects) and will help the limited funding available to go further, benefiting more in our community.

What are the funding streams?

Minor works - up to \$5,000.

Major works - up to \$20,000.

What are the criteria?

- Available to community and sporting clubs based in or predominantly serving residents of Mount Gambier.
- Available for facilities owned by the community or sporting club or facilities rented from the Council.
- All work to be completed within one month from the date of agreement, unless otherwise agreed in writing.
- Only one application from each of the funding streams.
- Funding from the Community Development Fund cannot be used to match fund other City of Mount Gambier grants requiring a group / club contribution.

How to apply?

- Minor works Complete the application form overleaf and submit to <u>city@mountgambier.sa.gov.au</u> with a quote from a local contractor and / or supplier.
- Major works Complete the application form overleaf and submit to <u>city@mountgambier.sa.gov.au</u> with a quote from a local contractor and / or supplier and a statement of the benefits to the community from the Council's investment in the project and whether the club / society is proposing to put any funding towards the work (max. 250 words).

If the works require other consents (Landlord Consent / Planning Approval) we will work with you to help you achieve these and will waive our fees for this work.

BACKGROUND

At the designated informal gathering on 23rd April 2020, Elected Members discussed the opportunities for accelerating maintenance and improvement works to public buildings and structures across the city. The Council has responsibility for many public buildings across the city and these range from the significant civic buildings (Civic Centre, Riddoch, Main Corner, etc.) to small storage sheds, public toilets, etc. These buildings and structures are included in an Asset Management Plan (AMP), which sets out the necessary building works required to maintain assets in an appropriate condition.

DISCUSSION

The approach of this project is to accelerate the carrying out of works to buildings and structures which was programmed to be delivered in any event in the next few years. Not all works, from every year of the AMP are intended to be carried out, but rather a balanced approach to delivery, as set out in **Table 1** that contains the existing works program plus a list of possible projects for acceleration. The balance here is also to ensure that we do not overdo work at this time which stores up a repeat requirement in a number of years.

The intent of this work is to push work out to local contractors and suppliers to ensure that the investment by the Council is felt as a ripple through the community. The balancing of projects includes a number trades and suppliers, many of whom will be receiving work from a number of sources. The possible works identified in Table 1 have a total estimated cost of \$2,254,600, of which \$1,237,100 is possible accelerated funds.

An exemplar project will be the acceleration of the works at the Railway Station, to enable the reuse of this particular historic building. This work was planned to take place over three years and is now intended to be completed by the end of June 2021.

BACKGROUND

At the designated informal gathering on 23rd April 2020, Elected Members discussed the opportunities for directly assisting those who may have lost their employment as a result of the impacts of COVID-19. This program is intended to offer a paid role for those in our community, particularly those for whom no other form of support exists.

DISCUSSION

Council have been briefed on the impact of the pandemic on local jobs flagged through the business survey. It is clear that the area of employment most significantly affected is those who were in casual employment.

Whilst the State and Federal Governments have both introduced stimulus packages, there are still an unknown number of people in our community who would like to work, but have not yet found an opportunity. This program is intended to:

- Provide up to six months of employment for those who have lost their job as a result of COVID-19, primarily for those who live in the City of Mount Gambier;
- Provide a resource for Council to undertake work which would otherwise have remained a low priority, but which will provide a significant amenity improvement in the city;
- Provide an opportunity for the Council to trial projects using the resource created;
- Provide a growth opportunity for Council staff to step up to a junior leadership role;
- Provide themed work groups, including a specialist one focused on creative outcomes across the city;
- Provide a sense of wellbeing and contribution for those engaged; and
- Provide an opportunity for those without specific skills related to these roles to gain paid experience.

Conversely, it is not intended to:

- Create a significant new number of local government employees;
- Duplicate the work of existing skilled staff; or
- Create an on-going resourcing issue for the Council.

It is intended to ease into the project, rather than recruit all resources expected immediately. This will enable the supervisory staff to plan and prepare and for the necessary equipment and materials to be found. Subject, to available funding this his program could employ a significant number of community members. Whilst the number 50 has been used, this is indicative and will be determined by the type of work available, the timeframe for that work and prioritisation towards grant funding objectives or requirements.

The areas of potential work are:

- As set out in the Places and Spaces Enhancement report elsewhere on the agenda;
- To enable a hard waste collection trial; and
- As may be determined by Council at any future time.

The funding for this project is flexible and will be curtailed if recovery comes more quickly than currently expected. Including manpower, equipment and materials, this project is expected to be in the order of \$1-2m depending on its longevity and breadth. This funding is the same as identified in the Places and Spaces Enhancement Report (and not a further area of funding), but it will also link to the provision of a hard waste collection service.

CONCLUSION

The above employment program is intended to prepare Mount Gambier for the easing of restrictions and to ensure that its spaces and facilities can be used safely and that they look good. Recent changes have made it clear that Council's need an enhanced cleaning regime for public spaces as outdoor spaces provide a lower risk environment for activities. The reopening and cleaning of facilities to keep them open will be of benefits to our residents. Enhanced cleaning may well find itself a feature of future stages of the easing of restrictions.

The proposal is also intended to make it clear that Mount Gambier is ready to receive visitors again. It is hoped that travel within the region and to the region will be eased early on in the transition to the new normal, given the length of time since a case in the region, the lack of community transmission and the level of cases in the State.

BACKGROUND

At the designated informal gathering on 23rd April 2020, Elected Members discussed the opportunities for improving the look and feel of public spaces in the city. This is not work that is seeking to make significant capital infrastructure investment, but rather smaller scale interventions that deliver maintenance and improvements across trails, reserves and our CBD. The intent is to use a new, dedicated workforce to achieve this, who will be supervised, coached and mentored by existing Council Officers. This approach has been outlined in more detail elsewhere on this agenda.

It is also linked to separate projects which are all intended to lift the quality of facilities in the city, generating a short-term boost for *Our People* and *Our Economy*, with a longer-term benefit linked to *Our Recovery*. Council will note the work being undertaken elsewhere which ranges from accelerating investment in public buildings, the creation of a new workforce, community and sporting facility funding to the longer-term delivery of the Community and Recreation Hub. All of these projects and their benefits are inter-related and form part of a larger whole of community benefit.

DISCUSSION

Our trails, reserves and other public spaces are of significant value to the city. They provide connectivity, green corridors, open space for recreation, playgrounds and give our residents and visitors a sense of wellbeing. Our public spaces help break up the built form and give our city its character, just as much as the buildings do.

They are also significant areas that often do not get the attention they deserve because we have so many and because budgets are unable to keep up increasing maintenance when a fiscally prudent approach has been taken to cap maintenance fund increases.

However, places and spaces throughout our city form a clear investment opportunity from COVID-19 funding, which will have benefits affecting *Our People*, *Our Economy* and *Our Recovery*. The intent of the project is to have a multifaceted approach which targets:

The intent of this project is to provide an investment in our places and spaces to lift their appearance. This is important for residents who get a year round benefit from our well-maintained facilities. It will also present the best view of the city as we hope to see visitors returning as part of the recovery phase.

In terms of our reserves, it is intended to ensure a city-wide approach to improvement. There is no hierarchy intended and as all reserves are valued by the parts of our community that they serve, they are all deserving of investment. This work will include the furniture and playgrounds within them, their paths and trails and is not expected to prevent their use for anything other than a short space of time. A focus will also be on ensuring their cleanliness in response to the reopening of playgrounds, the pump track and skate parks. The Conservation Park in the Crater Lakes will also see a concentration of effort.

In terms of our trails, particularly the rail trail, it is intended that as this space is being increasingly well used. There will be an intent to work out where new public art and outdoor gym equipment can be located so as to maximise the benefits, but also to reduce any future conflict with DPTI.

In terms of our streetscape, the works are identified to improve mobility and visibility (e.g. pruning low hanging branches) as well as amenity (reduced weeds, graffiti removal). Where appropriate planting is also envisaged to lift amenity in areas where space currently allows.

In terms of our CBD, the works are intended to clean and prepare the area as much as possible so that it is possible to install creative work more easily, to understand what our canvas is and what "Go big or Go home" would look like in really. Other key work will include the freshening up of existing planters and other street furniture, graffiti removal and the installation of the public art referred to previously.

Council will have to consider what the CBD needs in terms of capital investment for placemaking and it will need to make decisions about the future use of some of the spaces, including road space. This work is identified in the draft Strategic Plan and is not part of this project.

The funding for this project is flexible and will be curtailed if recovery comes more quickly than currently expected. Including manpower, equipment and materials, this project is expected to be in the order of \$1-2m depending on its longevity and breadth. This funding is the same as identified in the Employment Program report (and not a further area of expenditure).

CONCLUSION

The above works are intended to prepare Mount Gambier for the easing of restrictions and to ensure that such spaces can be used safely. Recent changes have made it clear that Council's need an enhanced cleaning regime for public spaces as outdoor spaces provide a lower risk environment for activities. REPORT RECOMMENDATION

- 1. That Council Report No. AR20/26985 titled '2020 Fringe Mount Gambier 2020' as presented on 05 May 2020 be noted.
- 2. That Council, as the auspicing body of Fringe in Mount Gambier, endorse full payment of the of \$50,000 budget allocation to cover the costs incurred by the Fringe in Mount Gambier planning committee and support artists and local suppliers consistent with the other Government funding bodies.
- 3. That Council acknowledge the cash position of the local business sponsors of the 2020 Fringe in Mount Gambier event in this current climate and endorse a cash reduction of 50% to the local business sponsorship contribution.
- 4. That Council acknowledge the contribution made by local business suppliers and sponsors to the success of the Fringe in Mount Gambier event and act in goodwill to retain the support of local business for the next event.

BACKGROUND

At the 18 Jun 2019 meeting of Council the following was endorsed:

- "2. That the City of Mount Gambier continue to support the growth of a sustainable model for the Fringe in Mount Gambier Festival
- 3. That the Fringe in Mount Gambier Festival remain a community led initiative that includes active involvement of local Fringe Ambassadors and secured funding parties.
- 4. That the roles and responsibilities of Council representatives in the planning and implementation of the 2020 Fringe in Mount Gambier Festival be conducive to building community capacity to encourage the ongoing cultural development of local artists, venues and businesses."

Consistent with this resolution, the planning committee of the 2020 Fringe in Mount Gambier Festival developed a program (**Attachment 1**) that included a combination of open-access and curated activities totalling 60 acts delivered across 25 participating venues for a period of 10 days. The feature weekend was to be 20 & 21 March 2020 and the extended program of open-access and ticketed events scheduled to be delivered through until 29 March 2020.

The projected audience numbers were expected to reach up to 19,000, given that the Fringe in Mount Gambier Festival has become one of the largest regional arts festival in South Australia.

Throughout planning the event the committee remained focussed on the growth of a community led, sustainable model. Secured funding partners for the event are:

- Arts SA(via Country Arts SA) \$10,000;
- South Australian Tourism Commission (SATC) \$13,000;
- Festivals Australia \$15,000; and
- City of Mount Gambier \$50,000 cash and up to the value of \$10,000 in kind.

This funding provided the planning committee with security to attract headline acts to the event that was then able to translate to a strong level of local business sponsorship for delivery of the event.

DISCUSSION

The cancellation of the 2020 Fringe in Mount Gambier due to COVID-19 one week out from the event delivery has had an enormous impact on the budget, participating artists, venues and local suppliers and sponsors of the event.

All paid site fees for participating vendors will be reimbursed and artist payments in accordance with the cancellation clauses in their agreements have been included for payment in the final expenses.

The organising committee have been working extensively to identify their obligations with secured funding partners and to establish their final financial position. All Government funding parties have honoured their agreements and, with release of the Council endorsed \$50,000 contribution all outstanding expenses can be met.

In light of the current climate and financial hardship currently experienced in terms of cash flow throughout our business community, it is proposed that the sponsorship agreements be relaxed and a 50% reduction be offered as an act of reciprocity to our business community at this trying time.

CONCLUSION

Participation, evaluation and extensive positive media coverage from the 2019 event, coupled with the strength of a 10-day program scheduled for 2020 Fringe in Mount Gambier that attracted similar media and community attention is a testament to event, its organisers and our community. Fringe in Mount Gambier is much more than an economic activity; it is a demonstration of a community collaborating to build its cultural capacity. How we work together and support each other during this unprecedented time will be remembered.

BACKGROUND

The Council has received a request to waive its fees and charges associated with outdoor dining. This report provides an opportunity to enable that request and to demonstrate that the Council is listening to its community.

DISCUSSION

As a result of communication from a local business linked to the Council's recent business survey, consideration has been sought to remove any Council fees and charges associated with outdoor dining. In this sense, outdoor dining is intended to mean the use of council land under some form of agreement for this purpose between a café, restaurant, pub, etc. and the Council.

Subject to the necessary insurance being maintained by the operator and that the activity is set up to occur safely, then there is an opportunity for the Council to reduce the regulatory burden on its businesses. This period is proposed to last until the end of the next municipal year, during which time the Council will consider its fees and charges afresh.

Council sets its fees and charges as part of the annual business plan and budget process and endorsed the fees and charges for 2020/21 on 21 April 2020. The fees and charges collected for this activity has been \$12,100 or less during recent years.

CONCLUSION

The Council has received a request to waive fees and charges associated with outdoor dining. As part of its approach to *Our City. Our Response* and its focus on *Our People; Our Economy; Our Recovery* it is considered that this demonstrates the listening approach being taken to engagement with our community on the pandemic. Outdoor activities, including dining, drinks, etc. may play a key role in the easing back of restrictions and as such it is recommended that the Chief Executive Officer be enabled to make this happen.

 - to prejudice the commercial position of the person who supplied the information, or
 - to confer a commercial advantage on a third party
- information concerning matters that must be considered in confidence in order to ensure that the Council does not:
 - breach any law, order or direction of a court or tribunal constituted by law,
 - breach any duty of confidence, or
 - breach any other legal obligation or duty

The Council is satisfied that the principle that the meeting be conducted in a place open to the public has been outweighed in the circumstances because the subject matter of the agenda item includes business information provided by survey respondents that has been provided inconfidence to assist Council in determining an appropriate recovery response to the COVID-19 health state of emergency, the disclosure of which could reasonably be expected to prejudice the commercial position of the parties that provided this information and/or confer a commercial advantage on other 3rd parties.

The public interest in the non-disclosure of this information is considered to be outweighed by the public interest in the determination and implementation of a successful recovery plan during and following the COVID-19 health state of emergency.

CONSIDERATION FOR KEEPING ITEMS CONFIDENTIAL

1. In accordance with Sections 91(7) and 91(9) of the Local Government Act 1999 the Council orders that the report 5.1 AR20/26987 Our City. Our Economy - Business Survey and its attachments, the discussion and the resolution/s and minutes arising from the report, having been considered by the Council in confidence under Section 90(2) & (3) (d) and (g) be kept confidential and not available for public inspection until 24 months have passed since the end of the COVID-19 health state of emergency has been lifted, to be reviewed every 12 months including for the potential extension of the duration of the confidentiality order if the
